
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

At the end of September we walked a loop from Barassie, along the shore, over the railway bridge, along the cycle path to Marr College and ultimately back along the shore.


This was probably the longest walk we have done to date and some of us were feeling it! We were pleased to welcome two new members that day.

Notes from Session

A meeting of the Kirk Session, chaired by the Moderator, The Revd Dr Scott McKenna, was held on 8^h June 2021. A summary of issues discussed at this meeting is given below:

- The Moderator warmly welcomed Mrs Gillean Richmond to her first
 meeting of the Kirk Session at Ayr St Columba Church. He informed
 Elders that Mrs Richmond would be with us on a full-time basis for 15
 months. He looked forward to a fruitful time and emphasised that the
 main purpose of the placement was training.
- The Moderator thanked Elders for their responses to the questionnaire on Eldership and Care. He had received over 50 responses and was in the process of analysing these. He would report back to the Eldership and Care Committee and bring a paper to the October meeting of the Kirk Session.
- The Presbytery Elder, Mr George Park, reported on the Presbytery meetings held by zoom on 2nd March 2021 and on 4th May 2021. Presbytery

had noted the Letters of Demission from the following Ministers: Rev Dr Ian Stirling, Minister of Fisherton and Kirkoswald Parish Churches from 1 June 2021. Rev Helen Cuthbert, Minister of New Cumnock Parish Church retiring on 11 July 2021. Rev Morag Garret, Minister of Ochiltree linked with Stair Parish Churches, call to Coalburn and Lesmahagow Churches from 12 May 2021.

- Presbytery agreed to establish a Local Church Review process fit for purpose to start immediately on the formation of the United Presbytery of Southwest Scotland, anticipated in September 2022.
- The Clerk reported that after years of excellent service, Mr Tony Greig had stepped down from his position as Assistant Treasurer. The Clerk had written to Mr Greig on behalf of the Kirk Session to thank him for all he has done in his time as Assistant Treasurer and to wish him well in his future endeavours.
- The Clerk was delighted to say that Mrs Pamela Naylor had agreed to take on the role of Assistant Treasurer. Mrs Naylor was well known to members of Session and she had been an active and much valued participant in a range of Church activities.
- The Midton Road Hall had been used as a Polling Station for the Scottish Parliamentary Election on 6th May. The preparations by the Council had been meticulous and everything had gone smoothly. The areas used were thoroughly cleaned before and after the event and we were left with 'state of the art' automatic hand sanitisers and a large quantity of facemasks.
- A Report from the Treasurer was read out in which he concluded that Ayr St Columba Church's financial position as at 31st May 2021 was a very healthy one.
- Mr J Stewart was pleased to report that the Wednesday Team were back in action. Two members were recovering well from replacement hip operations.
- The vents on the window ledges had been cleared to allow good ventilation in the Church.
- The Container in the grounds at Lochside was no longer required and had been sold. The contents of the Container will be redistributed to various charities. One hundred feet of fencing, which had enclosed the Container, had been donated to a local community garden project.
- Mrs Helen Greig reported that there had been two successful walks in good weather. The routes which had been used were available on request for anyone who might wish to do the walk in their own time.
- Mrs Greig spoke of the dedicated congregation at Lochside and the excellent work being done by volunteers at the Food Bank and, before Covid,

in the Kids' Club and in the Breakfast and Lunch Clubs. She reminded members that a splendid new kitchen had been installed and said that it was important to continue to support the volunteers, especially as we would be handing over responsibility for Lochside to others shortly and we should leave it in a strong position.

- An application had been made to obtain approval for Lochside to be a Food Service Provider and a rigorous hygiene programme, involving Food Hygiene certification and practices, would be put in place.
- Mrs I Bartholomew reported that the new photocopier had been successfully installed. Its capabilities were stilled being explored, but it printed beautifully and, so far, all the needs had been met.
- Mr K Fullerton was pleased to report that the Sunday School had met successfully outdoors on Sunday 9th May and on Sunday 16th May. They are now meeting indoors once more and he was greatly encouraged by the number attending. Mr Fullerton thanked Stuart McKinlay and the team for all their hard work. The Moderator added his thanks to Stuart, who had put in a tremendous amount of work throughout the period of Covid restrictions.

<u>Scott's sermon preached from St Mark 10:13-16 on</u> <u>Sunday, October 3, 2021</u>

George Bernard Shaw said, 'We don't stop playing because we grow old; we grow old because we stop playing'. And, related to that, one of the great physicists of all time, Albert Einstein said, 'Imagination is more im-

portant than knowledge'. Playing and imagination are vital components of what it means to be human and, surely, what it means to be a child. It is a delight to watch children at play and listen to their excitement and laughter.


Recently, in our Sunday morning worship we entered a house in the village of Capernaum with Jesus and His twelve disciples. The disciples had been arguing as to which of them was the greatest. Seated before them,



Jesus embraced a child and said, 'Whoever receives a child like this in My name receives Me, and who receives Me, receives not Me but the One who sent Me'. The Franciscan, Father Richard Rohr, says that the child was a favourite visual aid of Jesus.

In the Gospel of Mark, just one chapter later, Jesus again in His teaching welcomed a child and, placing His arms around the child, said, 'Let the children come to Me and forbid them not, for the Kingdom of God belongs to such as these.....Whoever does not accept the Kingdom of God like a child will never enter it'. Play and playfulness: do we think of our spiritual life in such terms? Do we bring the immense gift of imagination to our inner journey? In the mind's eye, let Jesus stand before us now, bring a child to His side, and with our own ears let us hear Jesus say, 'This is My teaching; this is what I mean when I speak of God'.

The fifth century theologian, Pelagius (left), said that when we look into



even speak of humanity's total depravity! This 'destructive' doctrine is based on a literal interpretation of Scripture; it is psychologically damaging and, in my view, mistaken. It does not help us to think of ourselves as

miserable sinners, incapable of loving God and unable to do good. Look into the face of the child Jesus holds and, in the mind's eye, see the love in Jesus' heart.

In Judaism – the religious tradition of Jesus – we read the poetic words of the psalmist: 'For it was You who formed my inward parts; You knit me together in my mother's womb. Wonderful are Your works!' Later, in the Book of Jeremiah, we hear God say: 'Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you.' God's love of us is total and all-embracing. On our spiritual journey, it is important to let ourselves be the child held and embraced by Jesus, and to feel intuitively and deeply the love of God within us. One of the 'demons' that many of us have to fight, sometimes even on a daily basis, is our lack of self-worth. In silent meditation, let yourself be held, upheld and cherished by Jesus, by the One who sent Him. The Gospels record the 'touch' of Jesus: it is important for us too to feel that affirming touch of reassurance and love.

In His ministry, Jesus raised three people: the young son of the widow of

Nain; the *young* daughter of the synagogue leader, Jairus; and Lazarus, the brother of Martha and Mary. Lazarus is an interesting biblical character. Deeply loved by Jesus, he never speaks. He was said to live in the home of his sisters. Was he young, a child, or perhaps a young man with what we would call learning disabilities? It seems likely that all three are young. In the ministry of Jesus, the symbol of resurrection – new birth, new life – is best expressed in the life of those who are spiritually a 'child': excited about God, playful, comfortable with mystery, imaginative and trusting.



One reason that I am particularly drawn to the image of a child for our spiritual journey is the way in which children are captivated and amazed by mystery. They are drawn in and, at their best, thoroughly inquisitive. In the tradition of Jesus, children are actively encouraged to ask about their faith and explore their spiritual journey. On one occasion together with others, I attended a Shabbat meal at the home of a rabbi. With bread and wine on the table, the rabbi retold the story of the exodus, the escape of the Hebrew slaves from Egypt. The rabbi told the story of the hunger of the people in the desert and the manna from heaven. As he spoke, a young person present interrupted him to ask, 'What is manna?' The rabbi said that he did not know for certain and, mischievously, asked me what I

thought it was! Do we see the boy Jesus interrupting His rabbi to ask questions of faith? He certainly had questions for the teachers in the temple. Perhaps we too could be encouraged to question and explore our traditional stories?

When I speak to children about baptism, I encourage them to see baptism, the sprinkling of water, as a 'kiss' from God; an embrace by God of the baby to be baptised. Baptism is a sign of God's unconditional love for the child and is in no way dependent on the faith of the child or his or her parents. For me, baptism is like Jesus embracing, touching and blessing a child, and the face of each child is the face of God born among us.

In his poem, *Water*, Philip Larkin, imagines water as being central to worship. From the Order of Service, we read:

If I were called in To construct a religion I should make use of water.

Going to church
Would entail a fording
To dry, different clothes;

My liturgy would employ Images of sousing, A furious devout drench,

And I should raise in the east A glass of water Where any-angled light Would congregate endlessly.

Worshippers would 'ford' or wade towards dry and different clothes. Each week would be a dunking and the sermon, the liturgy, would be full of watery images. For Larkin, rather than being a message of moral purity, fire and brimstone, religion would be one of cleansing, healing and weekly refreshment and restoration. An Anglican by birth, rather than the Eucharist each week, he hoped for baptismal renewal. To learn afresh each week that we are loved, cherished and embraced by God is surely to our spiritual gain. If we can be children again, excited by God, dazzled by mystery and unafraid of imagination, then perhaps we have caught something of Jesus' meaning with the child.


Energy prices are up and winter is coming

Increased energy prices are unwelcome when they come shortly before peak demand. Numerous energy companies are likely to go under this winter, depriving customers of fixed price deals they relied upon. The price of electricity is closely linked to the price of gas. In Scotland most of

our electricity comes from "renewable sources" that is if you consider nuclear renewable. Electricity tariffs are inflated by the generous feed in tariffs from the past.

It is likely that most of us will look at our energy usage because of increased cost. Are there things we might do to reduce gas and electricity consumption? Ayr St Columba Church will not be immune from cost pressures. We will need to consider simple practical things we might do to contain gas usage in particular.

Not long ago, but before the latest energy price hike, I wrote to our Minister



The Church of Scotland has twice voted to make Church property carbon neutral by 2030. This is a tall order! Most Church sanctuaries are not insulated and now we have the added problem of needing good ventilation due to Corona virus. What about our building? I have looked through energy bills and many of the readings are estimated. It is nevertheless possible to get a rough idea of Ayr St Columba's gas consumption shortly before the pandemic. It is 310,000 KWh per year. This number may mean little to you. We can add some perspective by considering the gas consumption



considered to be "medium" by a home in the UK. Medium gas usage is defined by the UK government as 12,000 to 17,000 KWh per year. Our Church building therefore uses enough gas to heat around 20 "average" UK homes and emits about 62 tonnes of CO2 per year.

The Church does not pay domestic rates for gas. Domestic gas charges include a substantial charge for the gas network. Commercial users of gas pay a flat fee for supply and a much lower rate for the gas itself. Our Church is therefore very exposed to increases in the price of gas because most of the cost is for the gas and not for the supply. Wholesale gas prices have risen four-fold in the last year.

We need to consider practical steps to reduce gas consumption for cost reasons. Perhaps we should also reduce consumption because our world cannot absorb emissions at the rate we generate them?

We have two big Clyde gas boilers in the Church basement and it is unlikely that we will replace them soon. There will be parallels in many of our homes too. So, what action should we take?

We know that in a domestic setting, reducing the room temperature by 1 degree centigrade will save 10% on gas consumption for heating (not hot water of course). We also know that setting an overambitious target usually fails and people return to their previous habits.

Improved heating controls can often achieve savings out of proportion to expense and very modest disruption. It is highly likely that we can make savings on fuel bills in the Church with modest outlay and without expecting people to be uncomfortable. I suspect that many of us can do the same at home. If we do this, we can take satisfaction in putting a brake on increasing fuel costs. In my view, we can also take satisfaction from the very slightly improved prospects for our descendants and we will honour Creation.

If we take a first step in reducing our carbon footprint, what comes next? Do we want a forum to discuss these matters outside a Session meeting? Do we have a plan for our Church and for ourselves?

Note of online meeting of the Presbytery of Ayr held on September 7, 2021

Presbytery Mission Plan: Presbytery noted that the Mission Committee will present recommendations for future charges and local allocation of ministry posts at the December 2021 meeting of Presbytery based on the outcome of Area groupings/sub-grouping discussions. If groupings/sub-groupings fail to reach agreement by November 1, then Mission Committee will recommend a default plan taking into consideration the state of local discussions, the starting point being Part A. In the interests of objectivity and fairness, members of the Mission Committee will not participate in the determination of default plans for their own areas.

Presbytery approve the creation of a Committee to co-ordinate and progress the Buildings Review component of the Presbytery Mission Plan. **Discretionary Allowance Committee:** The 5% Discretionary Allowance will continue in 2022 and applications should be sent to the Rev Gerald Jones, Convenor, Discretionary Allowance Committee by 31 October 2021.
