
On Sunday, September 8 in the Struthers' Room, I shall deliver a talk

Guild calls it a day after many years of fellowship

At our Annual General Meeting in March this year, little did we know that it would be the final meeting of The Guild in its present form. Since that meeting we sadly lost our Treasurer, Elizabeth Gardiner, whose life was ended by an inoperable cancer in May. We all miss Elizabeth and her always cheery nature and give thanks for the work she did for the Guild both expertly and willingly.

Earlier that Session we also lost a very loyal Guild member for many years in Margaret Black, who did a great deal to promote the Guild fundraising projects for some time. We respected those two ladies greatly and give thanks for their loyal service to St. Columba.

Due to an ageing membership, two years ago it was decided to move all the Guild meetings to the afternoon, knowing full well that this change would preclude younger members and those still working from attending.

This did indeed make a difference in that in the last year 74% of our members were in the senior age range and only three were under the age of 70. Since the A.G.M. in March it has been impossible to fill the vacant and necessary positions on the committee. At an Extraordinary General Meeting of the Guild on 23rd July it was unanimously agreed to follow the recommendation of the Committee to disband St Columba Guild and encourage our members to join The Monday Fellowship which meets on alternate Monday afternoons. I thank our Minister, Revd. Dr Scott McKenna, for his support and guidance in this difficult situation.

The Monday Fellowship follows a similar form as The Guild, the main difference being that it is not a National Organisation and is therefore not governed by the Church of Scotland in Edinburgh. The Fellowship meetings include worship, speakers arranged by their committee and finish with a welcome cuppa and chat.

The first meeting of The Monday Fellowship is on 7th October 2024 at 2 pm in the Midton Road Hall and I invite and encourage all existing members of the Guild to attend and enjoy a continuing afternoon of fellowship and friendship, remembering *Whose we are and Whom we Serve*.

In conclusion, my sincere thanks go to those who have served the Guild either on the committee or in attendance in recent years and I look forward to renewing our friendship and fellowship in the coming autumn.

Keeping up to date with all the Kirk Session business

Meetings of the Kirk Session were held on 16th April 2024, chaired by Revd David Ness, and on 11th and 24th June 2024, chaired by Revd Dr Scott McKenna. A summary of issues discussed at these meetings is given below:

The Clerk had received an email from the Presbytery Clerk in which she had expressed great concern at the treatment given to Presbytery officials at meetings with churches whose members were unhappy with the Presbytery Mission Plan. She said that the treatment was unchristian and unacceptable and urged everyone to treat each other with respect when discussing difficult matters. The Clerk was pleased to report that, following the purchase of the Bute Way Manse, the sale of 3 Upper Crofts was now complete and the monies had been received. There was a surplus in our favour following the transactions. This would be held by the Church of Scotland but would be available to us for fabric purposes. The Clerk informed Elders that the Business Committee has had its first meeting with our two new convenors, John Ballantyne and Kathy Smith, present. They had settled in very well. The Committee would consider the remits of all the Session Committees in the coming months.

Safeguarding: The Clerk reminded Elders that Mrs Mills had moved to live in Irvine and that she was seeking a new church there. We would therefore require a new Safeguarding Coordinator. He was very pleased to say that one of our new Elders, who was eminently qualified for the role, Mrs Millie McNish, had agreed, subject to the approval of Session, to take on this position. Mrs McNish had worked with the Sunday School for a long time and she would liaise with Mrs Mills to determine what was required. The Clerk asked for the approval of Session for Mrs McNish to take on the role of Safeguarding Coordinator at a date to be decided in consultation with her, Mrs Mills, the Minister and himself. This approval was given.

Mr John Ballantyne reported that matters relating to the replacement of the church boilers were progressing as expected. He urged all Elders and especially those on door duty to become fully aware of procedures for dealing with individuals who became unwell in church. The procedure could be viewed in the Carrick Park Vestibule. Elders should also be thoroughly familiar with the emergency evacuation procedures. Mr Ballantyne said that practice evacuations would take place more regularly in future. The Clerk said that copies of the procedures for dealing with unwell individuals and for emergency evacuation of the building would be sent to all Team Leaders, who could assign tasks to members of their teams. Ms Muriel Wilson reported that 9 adults, 4 children and 2 dogs (both named Rosie!) had taken part in the walk to Cornish Hill. The two-hour walk around and up the Hill had been most enjoyable. Another event being planned for the summer involved a drive to Largs and a possible visit to Nardini's.

Referring to Pastoral Care, Ms Wilson said that she was discussing possibilities with Mrs Fiona Taylor and Mrs Christina Kennedy. This area of provision required a coordinator. It was intended to seek support and identify needs via messages and leaflets in the Order of Service and to consider the congregational responses when deciding the next steps. The Moderator emphasised that members were very appreciative of visits from Elders and that it was a privilege to visit those who were lonely or in need.

<u>Student Minister</u>: The Moderator welcomed Mr Graeme Stewart to his first meeting of the Kirk Session. He indicated that, as Mr Stewart would complete his placement with us at the coming weekend, this would also be his last meeting. Mr Stewart was thanked for all he had done in his time with us.

Lochside Church Anniversary: The Moderator said that the Service conducted by the Right Revd Sally Foster-Fulton to mark the 90th anniversary of Lochside Church had been exceptionally good. The level of communication by Rt Revd Foster-Fulton had been excellent. He read out a letter the Clerk had received from Revd Roddy McNidder which contained a warm expression of gratitude from the congregation at Lochside to Matthew Hynes for his excellent Organ

playing, to Kathy Smith and the Fellowship Committee for the wonderful lunch and to Ayr St Columba Church for providing commendable support for Lochside for so many years.

Interim Moderator: Revd Dr McKenna is currently Interim Moderator at Troon Old Parish Church. The current three charges will be closed on 30th June. The Moderator has been appointed as Interim Moderator of the new united charge in Troon: Troon Church of Scotland. The work will include involvement with the Nominating Committee of the charge This will be a challenging task and he was privileged to have been asked to serve in this way.

<u>Church Treasurer</u>: The Clerk reported that he had met with the Treasurer and Mr Cairns had informed him that he intended to step down as Church Treasurer. He was not resigning immediately and would continue in his role whilst a successor was sought. He would also be happy to help any successor to fit into the role and would continue to help for as long as required.

The Clerk expressed his great regret that Mr Cairns would be leaving the position, but said we had to respect and accept his decision. He was very grateful that the Treasurer and the excellent team in the Finance Committee would continue to ensure the smooth running of our financial affairs. This was essential to the well-being of the church and its members.

The Clerk reported that South Ayrshire Council had requested the use of the Midton Road Hall as a Polling Station for the General Election on Thursday 4th July. This would mean that the Hall would not be available for a number of days before and after whilst the cubicles were set up and then dismantled. As the election was to take place in the holiday period our organisations should not be affected.

The Clerk said that it was necessary to add another person to the Safeguarding Panel in the Church following Lindsay Miller's departure some months ago. He was pleased to say that Dr Helen Hunter had agreed to join the Panel, subject to the approval of Session. Members of Session gave their warm approval for Dr Hunter to join the Safeguarding Panel, the members of which would be the Minister, the Session Clerk, the Safeguarding Coordinator, Mrs

Millie McNish, and Dr Hunter.

Generally, in respect to Safeguarding, the Clerk said that we would need to keep proper procedure at the front of our minds when dealing with activities in or connected to the church which involve young people or vulnerable adults and also when recruiting volunteers. He was sure that Mrs McNish would help keep us on the right path, but emphasised that this was everyone's responsibility. Mrs Bartholomew said that it was very important that anyone (Church Groups and private Groups) looking for the use of any room within the Church environs should complete a "Hall Lets Form" and sign off on the other documentation. If any Group was likely to require multiple Lets over the course of the year only one set of signed documents would be required.

Mr George Park had indicated his willingness to continue as Presbytery Elder for s further year. The Clerk had returned a form on behalf of the Kirk Session nominating Mr Park for the position. He asked that this action be homologated. Members of Session indicated their approval for Mr Park to continue in the role and homologated the Clerk's action.

Appointment of Treasurer: The Moderator referred to the fact that Mr Tom Cairns had decided to step down from his position of Treasurer after many years of excellent service. It was therefore necessary to appoint a new person to the role.

The Moderator, Clerk and Depute Clerks had met with Ms Sharon Lindsay. Ms Lindsay was a Church member and was a qualified Chartered Accountant. She had recently retired and during her professional career had held a number of high-level posts in finance. Ms Lindsay had indicated that she was willing to take on the role of Treasurer, subject to the approval of Session, and she had provided a brief biography which had been circulated to Elders.

Several members of Session spoke positively about their experience with Ms Lindsay, both at work and in church activities. She was a pleasure to know and to work with and they wholeheartedly recommended her for the role of Treasurer. A proposal that Ms Lindsay be appointed as Treasurer at Ayr St Columba Church, with a start date of 1st September 2024 was unanimously approved by members of Session.

Catch up with all the news from the Presbytery

Our Presbytery elder reports on the meeting of the South West which took place within Upper Annandale Parish Church, Moffat on 15 June 2024. As a large Presbytery, this report in detail focuses on some local decisions

and approvals.

Keynote Speaker: The Rt. Revd Dr Shaw Patterson, the new Moderator of the Church of Scotland outlined some of the challenges facing the Church with falling attendances. His message was one of encouragement, we need to build together and all have got a calling to serve God. He outlined that fear can be worse than reality and we must trust that God has a vision for us. We can be so busy that we block out God but we have to keep moving forward as a church. The power of the Holy Spirit is with us. Tributes: A number of ministers were recognised for their length of service since their ordination including our own the Revd Ian Paterson who was congratulated on his 60th anniversary of his ordination since 4 June 1964 which is a significant milestone in his ministry, ably supported by his

Guild: Mrs Rae Lind, National Convenor outlined that the Guild has been undergoing a review nationally to streamline its function, making it more efficient and representative today. Following the review, in Ayrshire, there will be two Guild Together Convenors instead of the three at present. South Ayrshire currently have three members on the National Council but this will reduce to two. Where congregations are uniting, it is expected that their Guilds also unite.

Property: Presbytery continues to struggle with the location and condition of many of the manses and acknowledge the ongoing transactions to unions and linkages across the Presbytery and note that it will be a little longer before matters settle down and the Property Committee can deal with the buildings and land stock that remains.

New Cumnock Church Manse: Approved expenditure of £21,000 to upgrade the Manse with roof repairs and window replacements.

Barr Church: Approved alterations including removal of pews, alterations to heating, toilets, new kitchen/servery area and create permanent access ramp. Total costs excluding VAT is £26,990 and as Barr has a long linkage with Dailly Church, which is due to close at the end of the plan period, the Kirk Session at Dailly have agreed to transfer £11,000 from their reserves to support the project at Barr. This will enable Barr Church to convert from Category B to Category A under the Presbytery Mission Plan. Barr will unite with the two Girvan Churches and Dailly Church in the

Arran Churches: Approved that the following church buildings will be disposed of: Lamlash Church and Hall; Corrie Church (closed) and Kilmory Church (closed).

Ballantrae Church: Approved removal of 6 pews (3 each side of the central aisle) to create a ,ore flexible space with 50% of the replacement chairs to have arms.

Dalrymple Church: Approved move to next stage of move from Category B to Category A with a flexibility study to take place.

Cumnock Trinity Church: Approved urgent/essential repairs costing £7,350 for the ongoing protection of the Church building.

Loudoun Church: Approved disposal of Loudoun Church building. The congregation voted on this on 5 May 2024 - number present 23 and 23 agreed disposing of the building.

Planning: Presbytery Mission Planning has been active across the whole of the Presbytery meeting Ministers, Kirk Sessions and Congregations to progress a number of adjustments.

The following Bases of Adjustments have been approved.

Troon: The Union of the Troon congregation (Troon Old, Portland and St Meddan's Parish Churches) and the new parish will now be entering into a Vacancy Procedure and will call a Team Ministry of two FTE Ministers of Word and Sacrament. The Rev Scott McKenna has been appointed Interim Moderator of the new Troon Church with effect from 1 July 2024.

Girvan Valley: Proposed date of union is 1 July 2024 for the Congregations of Barr, Dailly, Girvan North and Girvan South Parish Churches. *Prestwick:* Kingcase and St Nicholas: Date of deferred union dependent upon translation/demission/retirement of current incumbent for the congregations of Kingcase and St Nicholas Parish Churches.

North Carrick: Date of deferred union dependent upon translation/demission/retirement of current incumbent for the congregations of North Carrick, Kirkmichael and Straiton (St Cuthbert's) Parish Churches.

Ayr Legacy Update: 16 groups requiring adjustment, 5 complete involving 16 Congregations. Throughout Presbytery, 23 adjustments have been completed involving 74 Congregations. 29 groups remain to be adjusted involving 80 congregations. However, some of these adjustments are not possible under Ministers with Unrestricted Tenure.

Finance: The Presbytery Dues for 2024 will be based on 1.5% of assessable income. This is the same percentage base as last year. Presbytery Dues will be sent out in due course.

Mission: Presbytery encourage congregations to submit ideas for Seeds for Growth funding to the Mission Committee for evaluation. More information on the grants available (from just trying something missional or researching possibilities to major projects) can be found on the Church of

Scotland website. Any questions can be forwarded to Gavin Niven, Convenor, Mission Committee.

The Mission Committee are looking for someone to act as a Presbytery contact person for Messy Churches in the Presbytery. The role is to develop a list of Churches involved in Messy Church and distribute relevant information e.g. news of training events etc. Anyone interested should contact Gavin Niven.

The Mission Committee has been reviewing the Local Church Review process to assist in minimising the administrative burdens on Churches. They propose to synthesise as much as practical from existing returns plus existing reviews carried out by other committees; seek and annual review and update of congregational plans by each Kirk Session and ask for independent Presbytery contribution from a local church grouping of around 6 congregations; create a questionnaire for Kirk Sessions to complete 5 yearly. During 2024, the Mission Committee propose establishing local church groupings and initiate annual reviews of the Mission plan.

Safeguarding: The Safeguarding Committee recommend that the communication from the legal department which the Presbytery Clerk sent to all congregations should be discussed by Kirk Sessions.

TAKING AN ECO LOOK by Andrew Muirhead

Changes to your habits can have a big impact on carbon footprints

Individuals really matter

Key words: Carbon footprint; organic milk.

I often hear from people that it is governments and big organisations that have a responsibility to reduce carbon footprints. Also, Britain is responsible for only 1% of global CO2 emissions and it is China and countries with rapidly expanding populations that are the problem. What difference am I going to make?

Camilla Cavendish was a political advisor and head of the 10 Downing street policy unit. Now she is a journalist and writer. She does not think that either governments or scientific innovation are providing a solution to climate change.

In a recent article she wrote "This is the climate change paradox. The more obvious it becomes that the weather is changing, the more we seem determined to enjoy the last hurrah". The solution she proposes is "The middle class in rich countries would have an outsize impact if we changed our own behaviour. Not only because we burn the most carbon, but also because the better-off can set a tone".

To be fair, when I speak to others about carbon footprints, they already recycle and have reduced their use of plastic. It is worth knowing that food recycling is especially important. According to zero waste Scotland, food waste makes up 18% of household waste by weight but 30% by carbon impact.

The contents of food caddies are fermented and the gas used to generate electricity and the solids create compost. Food waste in a green bin, cannot be used for compost and capture of methane from dumps is incomplete.

Whilst recycling is a great start, much more is needed if we are going to respond to the challenge set by Camilla Cavendish.

Should we stop all the things that bring us pleasure and become militant eco-warriors? Well of course not! I do suggest that we all take a look at the countryside and its wildlife and consider if we want it to be available to our grandchildren too.

All of us really can do things that will make a difference in the four big

domains that influence our carbon footprint. These are:

- 1.Food
- 2. Home heating
- 3. Purchased goods
- 4. Travel

We can aim to reduce our carbon footprint year on year. In time we can also reduce our footprint to below "average" for the UK. These aims are not extreme but are a realistic response to the challenge posed by Camilla Cavendish.

The wwf footprint calculator is quick and simple to use. It will give you a good idea of where you stand at present. It does not show up some of the subtle changes you may choose to make in your lifestyle. For example, if you travel with 2 in a car, this halves your footprint for the trip. You may be able to drive at 60 mph instead of 70 and the saving will not show up on the calculator.

I have already written several articles on food. A healthy diet has a low carbon footprint. The big change is to eat mostly vegetarian food cooked from scratch. Buying organic food is sometimes very costly, but it will help preserve wildlife and topsoil. Malcolm Prior of the BBC wrote about the cattle farmed in sheds all their lives. This farming method may be economic, but is environmentally terrible and maybe not so great for the cows either! The cost premium of buying organic milk is modest and you can be sure none is sourced from cows that live indoors all their lives. The benefit to the countryside and biodiversity is disproportionately large. Is it time for the Church and those attending to ditch cheap milk and buy organic? Scottish organic milk marketing records that a family that switches to two pints of organic milk per day, will be responsible for converting 1200 sq meters of land to organic farmland. The Yeo valley blog elegantly sets out the benefits of organic milk. These include 50% more wildlife on organic farms and combating climate change because topsoil is retained.

In the other domains, it is possible to reduce gas consumption from home heating. Turning down the thermostat will help but there is plenty more we can do to improve gas consumption from gas boilers at low cost. I will write about this shortly.

The goods we buy have a carbon footprint that can be surprising. Buying high quality to last helps. Some people recommend that we make electronic devices last for at least seven years. Buying second hand, especially clothes and books really helps.
