From the Interim Moderator

Dear Friends,

By the time you read this pastoral letter we will have been vacant for almost a year. Except we are not 'vacant!', I would say we have become more vibrant because this in-between period allowed us to reflect on what has changed since we last called a minister, and what we now need that might be different in a new leader for future years. The dictionary meaning of vibrant to show intensity of activity and energy! I feel this is not an exaggerated description of the present thinking of our congregation.



The numbers at public worship on a Sunday morning are keeping up. Often when a minister leaves it causes a gap in leadership and as a result there can be a slow drifting away in attendance at church. That hasn't happened so far in St Columba Church.

Perhaps evidence for this is: we have just commemorated Armistice Day Sunday and the church was full! As I 'worked the room', both before the service and afterwards at tea/coffee, the number of parents attending to support their child as they presented the colours in the Scouts, was encouraging. Some of them live within walking distance from the church, and have had a previous connection with the church going back to when they were young. Which is something to reflect upon! The common comment was that they enjoyed the service and everyone was very friendly.

When my late wife, Mabel, and I first came to Sunday worship at St Columba a dozen years ago, we intended to go around the local churches to choose one that we thought we could fit in with. St Columba was the the first church we attended and the people we sat beside were so friendly that the following Sunday we said to one another - "if we don't go back again they might send us the church flowers!" So we made St Columba our home.

I want to report to you that there is also a vibrancy among the members of the Nomination Committee. They have set to with great enthusiasm, creativity and purpose and I can tell you - without giving away any confi-

dentiality - that we have met three times to: get a sense of what we need to do; set down a description of what kind of congregation we think are, therefore, what qualities we are looking for in our new minister? I am pleased to say that we have worked through these questions and the advertisement is now, as of mid November, on the Church of Scotland's website (the place where ministers seeking a new call would look within the Church, and those outside Scotland).

People are so kind in asking after me sensing I have taken on an additional workload in retirement. I can tell you that I'm loving it - and hope that comes through in my engagement with all of you. - (and I might apply for the post myself!!!).

It was said that Abraham Lincoln didn't like ministers who preached cut and dried sermons... Lincoln commented: "when I hear a man preach, I like to see him act as if he were fighting bees!" Perhaps we should include that in the job description for our new minister!?



Mary has some pencils and some jars.


If she puts 4 pencils into each jar, she will have one jar left empty.

Kirk Session business news

A meeting of the Kirk Session was held on 14th October 2025, moderated by Revd John Matthews. A summary of issues discussed at this meeting is given below:

The Moderator read out an email from Revd Bill Hewitt, convenor of the Vacancy Advisory Committee, in which he passed on the responses of Graham McWilliams, the Presbytery Planning Convener, to questions raised by our Nominating Committee.

The current plan of a five-year reviewable charge for Ayr St Columba meant that, under current guidance and with no other changes, Presbytery has no intention to review the charge before five years from the date of induction of the minister.

If the Auld Kirk and St Andrews become vacant in, for example, two years, the Minister of Ayr St Columba becomes the Minister of the Union, subject to the other congregations voting in favour of him or her.

The Moderator emphasised that there was a degree of uncertainty in the situation and, if we were to take on additional parishes, additional help from Presbytery would be required, possibly in the shape of an Assistant Minister.

The Moderator thanked everyone for their positive comments on the Service he had conducted with his son, Revd Stuart Matthews. He said that it had been a lovely experience to share worship with his son.

The Moderator said that it was important to consider the issue of Stewardship before a new Minister was appointed. Mr Tom Cairns had produced an excellent report on the trajectory of the church's finances which had been shared with the Treasurer, Session Clerk and Interim Moderator and which gave a basis for decision making. He asked for Session's permission to have a conversation with church members on the issues. This was agreed.

The Clerk advised members that he had received confirmation that the Moderator of the General Assembly, the Rt Revd Rosemary Frew, would conduct worship at Ayr St Columba Church on Sunday 2nd November. She would be accompanied by her husband, Mr Dave Frew.

The Clerk said that having taken account of the views expressed at the last Session meeting, from the October Service of Holy Communion he would ask Elders on Communion Duty to sit in the

Choir seats. The Choir would be asked to join the congregation. The Communion elements would remain on a table at ground level. In October he would keep the status quo regarding elements and serve grape juice only, but he would be interested to know if there was any feeling that we should return to serving both port and grape juice next year.

Mr John Ballantyne brought members of Session up to date on the plans for a new door system at the Carrick Park entrance. Two options were being considered.

Mr Keith Fullerton informed Elders that a trip to the Astoria Cinema to see a live recording of 'The Nutcracker' was being organised for 10th December. This would include a meal at the Tudor restaurant.

Mr Fullerton asked for permission to have a retiring offering at the close of the Communion Service on 26th October in aid of the children of Gaza. It was clear to all how much suffering there was in Gaza. Money donated would be sent via UNICEF. This was approved.

<u>Vote on Departure</u>: The Clerk explained that during each Vacancy a Kirk Session had to decide on whether or not to depart from the Church of Scotland's practice regarding Ministers in same-sex relationships. A vote to depart would mean that applications could be considered from, amongst others, individuals in same-sex relationships. More importantly, it would be a signal to all potential candidates that the Church was not narrow minded. As a result, it was likely that more people would consider applying for the Minister's position.

Voting forms were distributed and completed. They were counted in front of the Kirk Session. The number of votes cast was: FOR departure from the Church's practice 43; AGAINST departure from the Church's practice 4.

The Clerk announced that the Kirk Session had decided that Ayr St Columba Church would depart from the Ministers and Deacons in Same Sex Civil Partnerships and Same Sex Marriages Act (Act 1 2015).

Puzzle 3: Phoebe drove the furthest.

Reasoning: Assume the total distance of the journey is D.

What are people actually doing to prevent climate change?

Appreciation of nature looms large in any article or discussion about climate change. Most people love nature and the mental health benefits of being in beautiful scenery are well known. In addition Spirituality of all kinds relies heavily on the natural world. There is an assumption that appreciation will become a doorway into action to preserve what we have. All too often, there is no action and when there is, it disappoints. I wanted to understand better how the climate lobby operates and if it can become better aligned with the aspirations and goals of the general population.

Visit to "mass climate lobbying event"

This was delivered by an organisation called "Stop Climate Chaos Scotland" on 18.9.25 at Dynamic Earth, a conference and exhibition area next to the Scottish Parliament. A huge number of organisations are affiliated. They staffed stands, handed out flyers and waved banners. The event itself was well organised with slick messaging to MSPs, to invite them to attend, presentations and a brief training on how to interact and what to say.

Discussion with MSPs

The MSPs joined a group at each table and each delegate had one minute to speak. The MSP who was at my table spent much of her time speaking about the eco projects that she had been involved with herself. I was unconvinced that any message had been received or that any policy might be modified as a result of the meeting, other than an indication that there is still a body of people supporting Group.

article in the Herald on 28.10.25 by Josh Pizzuto-Pomaco. He wrote about a report by the STUC. He noted that for every £1,000,000 generated by Scotland's wind electricity industry, 1 job was created. By



This was on a screen while a representative from the world wildlife fund recommended that we ask for community energy,

contrast, the fossil fuel industry generated 13 or 14 jobs for a similar turnover. Apparently wind makes up over half of the low carbon economy in Scotland. Does this amount to "A fair transition with clean energy and green jobs?". How might community energy differ from any other type of energy?

The STUC has recommended that investment could be adjusted to support other green projects at the expense of wind. For example Alexander Dennis manufactures electric buses and nearly had to shut its Scottish factory due to lack of orders locally. The STUC suggests that this and other projects might prove a better investment at this stage. I ask why is it necessary for the STUC to make this report at all?

Reality of the Green transition, BBC article

On 14.10.25, Zoe Conway reported that according to the National Audit Office, "98% of homes that had external wall insulation installed by the previous government have problems that will lead to damp and mould if left unaddressed." Also "29% of the homes that were given internal insulation also need fixing." Apparently 10s of thousands of homes are affected.

What might be done?

It is no simple matter to make a radical change in the way our country operates. Even so, it might be possible to do a bit better. We have representatives, have you expressed your opinion to them? Can you imagine a way to do things better and still respect the natural world and our representatives? If so, this might be a good moment to speak truth to power.


