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From the manse

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Dear Fríends,

Christmas

Government census, taxation, a journey of hardship and danger, the scramble for accommodation, shepherds working at night in their fields, choirs of angels, a cave and manger for a birth, wisemen (Magi) from the east bearing gifts, and the flight to Egypt evading the slaughter of Bethlehemite chil-



dren. Not mentioned in the Gospels of Mark and John, the earliest and latest Gospels to be written, the Christmas or Birth narratives of Matthew and Luke are an overture, a dramatic opening, to this most sacred Scriptural symphony!

The German poet of the nineteenth century, Heinrich Heine, wrote eloquently of the wise men:

> 'Dear children', they asked in every town Three kings from the land of the sun, 'Which is the road to Bethlehem?' But neither the old nor the young

Could tell, and the kings rode on; Their guide was a star in the air Of gold, which glittered ahead of them, So clear, so clear.

The star stood still over Joseph's house. They all of them stepped in; The good ox lowed and the little child cried, And the kings began to sing.

In the time of Jesus, there were many stories of virgin or miraculous births. In Judaism, the birth of Isaac was accompanied by a visitation to Abraham; for her part, Sarah is very old, well beyond the age of conception. In Roman storytelling, Emperor Augustus was the divine son of the

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god, Apollo; a virgin birth. In one account, the Roman Senate ordered the killing of young children because they feared the birth of a new Roman king. Alongside Augustus, divine heritage was attributed to Alexander the Great and the Roman General Scipio Africanus.

What matters most is the meaning in the metaphor. For me, the Birth narratives of Jesus might make more sense if they were placed at the end of the Gospels as an affirmation of all that has gone before. Placed at the end, they would more easily encapsulate the spirituality and ethical teaching of Jesus: His repeated emphasis that God is within us, born within us, and His cherishing of every human being. For me, the Christmas narrative is a meditative text. In silence, in the soul, amidst the politics and trials of everyday life, including the trauma of the virus and restrictions, we may hear the angels sing, begin anew our own journey – inner pilgrimage - towards Jesus and, in moments alone, realise that the Word of God, the essence of God, is born afresh in us.

Notes from Session

Meetings of the Kirk Session, chaired by the Moderator, The Revd Dr Scott McKenna, were held on 11th February 2020 and on 22nd September 2020 (by Zoom). A summary of issues discussed at these meetings is given below:

11th February 2020

Persons Unwell in Church: Many who felt faint in church were wearing too many clothes. The advice was that outdoor clothing be removed in church and care should be taken when standing up.

Eco-Congregation: Dr Andrew Muirhead reported that a committee had been set up and the first event would take place on February 17. This would take the form of a Climate Conversation and members were encouraged to attend.

Children's Ministry: The Moderator referred to a paper outlining his

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proposals for the 9.30am services. Under the proposals, children and their parents would attend the Family Service at 9.30am, with the children leaving at around 9.48am to attend St Columba Kids activities. Following the conclusion of the Service at around 10.08am, the parents of young children would share coffee together until they collected their children from St Columba Kids at 10.30am. The Kirk Session gave their approval for the Moderator's proposals.

Holy Communion: Following discussion it was agreed that grape juice only should be used at all services of Holy Communion.

Flower Deliveries: The Clerk had received a letter from Mrs Elizabeth Shaw in which she had indicated that she was stepping down from her role in organising the delivery of flowers to members following the Sunday services. The Clerk spoke warmly of the work Mrs Shaw had done over the years and thanked her for this.

Free Will Offerings: The Clerk had received a letter from Mr Alan Hawthorn indicating that he wished to step down from his role as FWO Convenor. The Clerk expressed the gratitude of Session for the excellent work Mr Hawthorn had done in the role for many years and members indicated their warm appreciation of this. Mr Graeme Savage had agreed to take over the position of FWO Convenor and members warmly approved his appointment.

Review and Planning Committee: The Clerk said that the R&P Committee had a continuing role in the management of activities at Lochside and he proposed that Mrs Helen Greig, convenor of the WMO Committee, which has responsibility to oversee outreach work at Lochside, should join the R&P Committee. This was approved.

22nd September 2020

<u>Welcome</u>: The Moderator welcomed members to the first meeting of the Kirk Session to take place on Zoom and to the first meeting since lock-down restrictions were imposed on March 19, 2020.

Services provided during lockdown: The Moderator informed Elders of the ways in which the Church had continued to provide worship services and to keep in touch with members at a time when significant restrictions were in place due to the Covid-19 pandemic. These included: Written Sermons, Audio Sermons, Private Prayer Sessions, Dial-a-Sermon, Written Wednesday Reflections, Audio Wednesday Reflections, Wednesday Services, Sunday Services, Recorded Services, Notices in Church, Intimations, two issues of the Church Magazine and now a Session meeting conducted via Zoom. The Moderator expressed his gratitude to all involved in

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making the recordings, making special mention of Mrs Anne Mills, who had quickly developed impressive skills in editing. He also thanked Norman Reid and Irene Bartholomew for producing the recent issues of Columba News in-house.

Lochside: The Moderator referred to the fact that Presbytery was currently considering the future structure of churches north of the river.

Following lengthy discussion members agreed that Presbytery would be asked to consider Lochside Church as part of the ministry and mission of churches in north Ayr.

<u>Review and Planning Committee</u>: During lockdown it had been necessary for the R&P committee to take decisions on behalf of the Kirk Session. Among the actions of the Committee were:

*The decision to close Church buildings at Midton Road and at Lochside for all worship services and all activities from March 19, 2020. An exception to this had been made for the Foodbank at Lochside, as it continued to provide an essential service to the local community.

*The decision to ask the Church Secretary to work from home and thus keep the church community active and enable information to be distributed.

*The decisions taken regarding the furloughing of the Director of Music and the church cleaners. The Clerk said that no member of staff had experienced a reduction in their income during the crisis.

*The ongoing management of matters at Lochside.

*The analysis and interpretation of the Church of Scotland guidance document, of which there had been seven versions, with the latest running to 64 pages.

*The completion of a Buildings Checklist and a Covid-19 Risk Assessment, which were prerequisites for obtaining permission from Presbytery to re-open the Church. The Clerk expressed his gratitude to John Stewart for his work on this.

*Decisions relating to the re-opening of the Church for private prayer and for the resumption of services.

*Establishing the availability of members to form Duty Teams and devising appropriate instructions for Duty Team members. The Clerk expressed his gratitude to all the team leaders and duty team members for their work in enabling Services to be resumed.

*Ensuring that requirements relating to social distancing, hygiene, face coverings and signage were implemented.

*The decision to source equipment and training to allow services to be

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recorded and made available via the website.

*The forming of a 'Recording Team'. The Clerk thanked Keith Fullerton, Brian McKinlay, Alastair Swan, Irene Bartholomew, John Stewart and Anne Mills for their contributions to the recordings. Without previous experience, the team had quickly become proficient in camera work and Anne Mills had added great editing skills to her ability behind the camera. *Discussion of matters related to the Central Mission Focus Group and the plans for the future structure of churches in Ayr.

*The development of a Hygiene Protocol for the resumption of food provision at Lochside, when this eventually occurs. The Clerk thanked Mrs Laraine Christian for her help with this.

*The in-house production of two issues of Columba News. The Clerk thanked Norman Reid and Irene Bartholomew for their extensive work on this

Discussion of various financial matters.

The Clerk said that it should be noted that there had been a great deal of pressure on the members of the Review and Planning Committee over the past six months. He was extremely grateful to each member of the Committee for their invaluable work in helping to ensure that Ayr St Columba had remained strong, responsive and forward looking during this difficult time in its life.

Communication: In discussion, it was agreed that there was a need to be in better contact with members as the Covid-19 restrictions were likely to be in place for a considerable time. It was therefore agreed that we should seek the permission of all members to retain phone numbers and, where available, email addresses. This would facilitate communications and the distribution of information.

Memorial Plaques: The Clerk informed members that the brass plaques recording the service of our former Ministers had been received and would be dedicated at a time still to be decided. Mr Alastair Swan had prepared and framed the pictures of Revd Bill Christman and Revd Fraser Aitken, which were to be placed in the Carrick Park Vestibule.

Last year the WMO committee chose "The Night Before Christmas" for St Columba's Christmas Appeal. Due to the generosity of the congregation we were able to give 80 shoe boxes, filled with goodies, to the charity to be distributed to families in need.

When the WMO committee agreed that Abbas Rest would be the 2020 Christmas Charity, the Scottish Trustees, Madge and Malcolm from Alloway Church, Ian from Irvine and myself, were really delighted. We have been coordinating the charity's work in one of the poorest areas of south Malawi since it was founded in 2000.

We work with the project manager, Chikondi, and the Malawi Trustees to improve the lives of those in need of extra help and support. AND recently we've been holding regular zoom meetings which Chikondi is able to attend, all the way from Malawi! Modern technology is marvellous!

Most of Abbas' income originates from regular donations from generous folk, with occasional fund raising events, which of course have not been possible this year.

What is wonderful about our "wee" charity is that there are no administrative overheads- all our income goes directly to support Abbas' work in the villages in south Malawi.

<u>Tribute to Robin Doncaster elder of</u> <u>Ayr St Columba</u>

We have come here today to give thanks to God and to celebrate Robin's life. We all have our special memories of him. The times we were in his company - the laughs we had – the conversations – the things we did together, and when we think of these, our own special personal memories, we realise just what a lovely man Robin was – what a great character he was – what he meant to us – and just how much our knowing him enriched our lives – and he truly did that.

He was born in Seafield Maternity Hospital. His mum and dad were Roberta and Bert. He was actually named Robert but in order to avoid confusion, he became known as Robin. He had one brother William who sadly died in infancy, and of course a sister Helen. They were a close family and Robin remained close to Helen and her family all his life. He was brought up in Irvine and attended Irvine Royal Academy. He left school at 15 to begin an apprenticeship as a Monumental Letter Cutter. He finished his apprenticeship and was with the company for another five years. You know, he restored the lettering on the gravestone of one of Robert Burns close friends – Davie Sillars. I love the story of when he was courting Margaret, he would take her to cemeteries, show her gravestones and said, "I did that one." How is that for romance and winning the heart of an 18-year-old young girl?

When he was 25, he changed profession and became a salesman for what was then known as McVitie and Price - they eventually became United Biscuits., He naturally enough was promoted and began looking after the accounts of the big supermarkets, Wm Low, Safeway, Prestos, Food Giant - these are all names from the past, as well as Tesco and ones we are all familiar with now. You know his biggest sale was 100 cases of Jaffa Cakes to Tesco's in Avr. The folk in Avr who shop at Tesco must love Jaffa Cakes. He was an excellent salesman and known for his splendid displays of biscuits in the various shops. Countless stories abound of his exploits in the biscuit trade and he was extremely popular with all his customers and with everyone he met. I love the story when United Biscuits brought out the biscuit TAXI. They gave Robin a vintage car with TAXI written on the side when he was promoting this new biscuit. One day he took his boys to the school in this ancient car, which naturally aroused the interest of their fellow pupils. As Craig and Stuart alighted, Robin produced a box of Taxi biscuits, threw them into the playground, thus pro-

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ducing a massive scramble. He took early retirement from United Biscuits and was asked to join Ianotti's Cash and Carry where he worked for 3 days a week . He finally retired in 2014.

He met Margaret through Prestwick Amateur Opera Society. I am led to believe that they eyed each other up during rehearsals and then eventually Robin summoned up the courage to ask her out. Their first date, was not to a cemetery to admire his handiwork, but for a walk – they walked from Prestwick to Ayr. He put on new shoes for this auspicious occasion and they just about destroyed his feet. Love blossomed – they were engaged six months later and married in Castlehill Church on 10th August 1968. It would be true to say that they were utterly devoted to each other. Who do you think was the boss?

They set up home in Portland St., Troon - have had various dwellings over the years ending up in their present home in 1992. In the fullness of time the family came along. Sadly a son George was stillborn which was a devastating blow to both Robin and Margaret. But in 1971 Craig was born, to be followed three years later by Stuart. When they married Kirsty and Tracy respectively, they produced the grandchildren Hollie and Emily, Adam and Abbie. Robin's family was complete and he was utterly devoted to them all. He truly was a fantastic husband, father, and grandpa. There was nothing he would not do for them. He loved them all to the uttermost and at his happiest when they were around. He loved playing golf with the boys, football and flying kites with them, as well as long walks with the family. First and foremost Robin was a family man. He lived for them.

He wasn't a bad cook either. He loved to try all sorts of things and was an avid watcher of cookery programs on TV. He was the chief soup maker in the household – and the whole family benefitted from and eagerly devoured his efforts with great relish.

His main interest in life was singing. He possessed a rich baritone voice and was an enthusiastic member of the Ayrshire Philharmonic Operatic Society playing many roles in their various productions. His favourite part was Gabriel Von Eisenstein in Die Fledermaus. APOS played a huge part in in both Robin and Margaret's lives, in fact they were members for over 50 years. and it was there that they met people who were to become their best and closest friends. Robin at one time was President and Front of House Manager. He was also a member of the Dreghorn Musical Society and indeed served as their Treasurer for a number of years. That organisation also meant a great deal to him. He also sang at Burns Suppers, Old Folk Homes etc. He loved excursions to see Musicals.

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The church meant a lot to him. He loved his church and his Lord. He was an enthusiastic member of our church choir. I have vivid memories of him in his purple gown and he was seldom absent from the choir pews. During lockdown he greatly missed his many friends in the church and the fellowship of the church family.

He was an elder, being ordained in Troon Old Parish Church and then serving here in St Columba. He was an extremely diligent elder, always giving of his best.

When a boy he joined the Boys' Brigade rising up through the ranks to become an Officer as well as gaining his Queens Badge. He was also a fervent supporter of Irvine Meadow Football Club.

He loved his holidays, especially with his friends. They visited Canada, Portugal, Menorca, Crete and France to mention but a few. He was involved in some amusing incidents, which are too numerous to recount here.

Let me mention two. On a Baltic cruise they visited St Petersburg. Robin managed to narrowly escape detention by the KGB when in a market, he clumsily almost demolished a stall of Russian Dolls. In Portugal, on a remote hillside, in a rented villa, he and his friends were sunning themselves by the pool when a car approached and two quite elderly English ladies got out and entered into conversation with them. Robin enquired, "Are you lost" They turned out to be two Jehovah's Witnesses. Maybe they_thought Robin was "lost" and needed salvation.

Robin was a truly lovely man – a gentleman through and through. As you know he did not always enjoy good health, but he never let it get him down. He was always positive, accepting his lot in a way that was an example to us all. He never complained and was always cheerful. He would speak to anyone and folk felt at ease in his company. He loved telling jokes and stories – possessed a great, almost mischievous, sense of humour. Life was never dull in his company. He would do anything to help you. He was genuine – no airs and graces. He had many friends and if it were not for the restrictions imposed because of Covid this church this afternoon would be bursting at the seams.

AYR PRESBYTERY UPDATE

The Business and Nomination Committee representing Ayr Presbytery met on line by zoom on September 1, 2020 and agreed the following: **Discretionary Allowance Committee:** Applications for consideration should be sent to the Convenor (Rev Gerald Jones) by 31 October 2020. Priority will be given to mission related projects with prospective churches first examining their unrestricted funds prior to making an application. **Lugar Parish Church:** Presbytery agreed to approve an application from Lugar Parish Church to create a Heritage Information Centre and Community Hub within the church building through the provision of disable access, toilets, cafe' and exhibition space. The cost is approx £115,790 inclusive of vat.

Pioneer Farming Minister: Presbytery agreed to continue the Pioneer Farming Minister post using 50% FTE MDS post supplemented by 50% funding from the 5% Presbytery Discretionary Fund.

Architectural Quinquennial Visitation: Presbytery noted that the above visitations for this year can recommence for the nine churches involved including Ayr St Columba.

Ochiltree and Stair Parish Churches Manse: Presbytery approved the application from the above churches to carry out a major refurbishment of the manse to eradicate a significant dampness issue, the property presently being vacant and uninhabitable in the current state. The total cost will be approx $\pounds120,000$.

Barony Campus, Cumnock: Presbytery agreed to apply to the Central

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Church for agreement to appoint a Mission Development post to the Barony Campus, Cumnock.

20 October 2020

Ayr Presbytery met online by zoom on October 20, 2020 and agreed the following:

Presbytery Moderator 2021-22: Presbytery agreed that the present Moderator, the Rev David Prentice-Hyers serve for a second year as Moderator due to the impact of Covid-19.

Monkton and Prestwick North Parish Church: The Rev Morag Crossan who was Locum at Monkton and Prestwick North Parish Church has been appointed as Minister Elect of Canonbie and Liddlesdale.

Re-opening of Churches and Halls - Unoccupied Buildings: Presbytery reminded congregations that in order to avoid triggering an unoccupancy condition, relating to insurance, it is necessary to conduct a 'service' or engage in an alternative use of the premises every 45 days. This equally applies to Halls, particularly where Church Hall accommodation is a separate building, potentially on a separate site. Congregations are reminded that in order to reopen any building, Church or Hall, it is necessary to submit to Presbytery a copy of duly completed Buildings Checklists and Covid-19 Assessments, remembering that separate hall accommodation requires a separate return of the appropriate documentation.

Lochside: Presbytery noted the request by Ayr St Columba to include the area of Lochside in the Presbytery planning process for churches in North Ayr, reminding parties that it in the gift of the Presbytery to consider such a request as planning progresses.

Permission to Call: Presbytery agreed to suspend any new permission to call and any renewals of call for Parish Ministers until May 2021.

TAKING AN ECO LOOK by Andrew Muirhead

Sustainable transport, a personal perspective

Our lifestyle in the UK has a large carbon footprint. Most of our emissions are down to personal choices and we can therefore do something to preserve nature for our descendants. Household energy, food, travel and purchase of goods all contribute to our carbon footprints. From a personal perspective, I have been able to make reductions in most areas but travel has proved more difficult than the other categories.

I am more reliant on a car than I care to admit. The Scottish Government expects us to be carbon neutral by 2045. No allowance for emissions from overland transport is built into their calculations. This means that all motor and rail transport will have to be powered by electricity (or perhaps hydrogen fuel cells) by 2045. The EU has required a large drop in the mean emissions from cars sold in the area from April 2021. This new regulation

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is behind much of the electric car advertising at present. Should we all go out and buy an electric car to replace our fossil fuel cars in the near future? Will going electric reduce emissions and pollution in general?

I admit I am somewhat of a gadget man. I love clever new machines and am therefore susceptible to advertisers selling shiny new toys. Electric cars take time to recharge and there is concern that a vehicle could run out of power and leave the driver stranded. Batteries have been enlarged in cars over the last few years and this is less of a concern. The electric grid has been nearly decarbonised in Scotland, so charging is nearly carbon neutral in this area. We all know that rechargeable lithium batteries degrade over time. Car batteries are mostly guaranteed for 8 years but may need to be replaced soon after that. Typically, the battery is 30% of the new car cost in electric vehicles. In practice this means that the life span of an electric car manufactured today may be only 8-10 years. This makes me hesitate, particularly as the price is higher than a fossil fuel car.

The reliability of cars has been recently researched by Which? Magazine. Between December 2019 and February 2020, 47,013 owners of 55,833 cars have reported their experiences. Their article was published on 14/8/2020. The most reliable cars by fuel type may surprise you! Petrol hybrid cars were the most reliable and plug in petrol hybrids the least reliable in 2019. In between come, petrol, diesel and electric in that order. When the reliability by price was examined, the least reliable were the most expensive luxury brands! Jaguar, Land Rover and Tesla did particularly poorly.

On 8th June 2020, the South China Morning Post printed an article. "A 'million mile' battery from China could power your electric car". They reported an interview with Zeng Yuqun, chairman of Contemporary Am-

perex Technology Co Ltd (CATL). He said that his company could now provide much longer lasting batteries and he is waiting for his first order of the new technology. CATL has recently signed a 2-year deal with Tesla motors. It is likely that the first cars that will be fitted with a "million mile battery" will be Tesla series 3 cars assembled in Shanghai. These batteries are 10% more expensive than standard lithium batteries and are likely to last at

least 16 years against 8 years for a standard lithium battery. This company supplies batteries to German manufacturers and is planning manufacturing



plants in Europe but not the USA yet.

It seems that current electric cars are not very reliable and are not durable. They are also expensive. In future, these faults might be rectified and new benefits added to the attraction of an electric vehicle.

At present, the energy supplied by the electric grid is around one third of the energy supplied by the gas grid. As we decarbonise, household heating and cooking is bound to move to electric suppliers. When added to electrification of transport, the demand for electric power could be enormous. Green energy is provided when available and not necessarily at times of peak demand, such as 4pm to 7 pm. A method of storing electricity for peak demand will be required. According to its website, Ovo energy has started a trial in collaboration with the UK Government, "The vehicle to grid" trial. This uses the Kaluza V2G car charger in private driveways. The car is plugged in and a smartphone app controls charging. When demand on the grid is high, the car battery discharges to assist (the car owner is paid for this power). When demand is low, the battery charges up. This scheme is brilliant because it stores renewable electricity without building new infrastructure.

There is of course a problem. The lifespan of the car battery will be shortened. This problem should be overcome by the million mile battery.

What is the message here? If we are environmentally careful, it

is of course important to walk, cycle and use public transport where feasible. If you live in a big city and are young, you can probably manage with no more than occasional use of a car club vehicle. If you live in the country or a small town, a car may be unavoidable for many of us. In the future, an electric car will be a reasonable investment. For now, I would want a reliable and durable option. My choice is a petrol hybrid car. If money is tight, a small petrol car from a reliable brand is a reasonable second best.
